

The Childrens TV and security of the Day Care Centre

Were the children not disadvantaged enough someone stole their TV. This was used mainly for watching cartoons and we can only imagine the absolute glee and noise that this generated. To



some extent it also provided for any education videos that the headmaster could locate.

The really pressing issue is larger than that, as the Day Care Centre is insecure hence there's a real risk of theft and loss of any replacement. On top of that an external wall and gate have collapsed, something that will be a lot more expensive to fix. Our sister charity examining the security issue, but it's all in the

air right now, so we'll keep an eye on it and let you know how it's progressing.

Medication for the smallest children.

Background. In this land about 1 in 25 babies die during their first year of life, and many of those deaths are attributable to the common risk factor of maternal undernutrition, low birth weight, and about 57% of these deaths are due to treatable infections. In the "developed" world this figure is typically 1 in 250.

So we've been examining how we can reduce the general burden of family costs and disease misery in the village at the same time. As a rough measure a typical medication charge for an adult is of the order of 70 Dalasis (about £0.85) against an upcountry daily wage of 100 - 150 Dalasis.

This must all be seen in an economy where being able to eat every day was not always guaranteed but was becoming more common. Recently however it's going backwards with crippling food inflation of about 22%, and the really bad times could be returning for the poorest of families. The impact is becoming very real, very quickly indeed and it doesn't appear to be slowing down.

Counter intuitively, medication for a small child is approximately twice the price for an adult, with a typical treatment for a baby at about D180 (£2.40). This is vastly out of reach of all but a very few, and many potentially fatal and often inexpensively treatable complaints are left to develop and kill.
